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Founded in 1975, Eden began as a small, family-oriented school for individuals with autism. Today, Eden offers an extensive range of services to meet the needs of individuals with autism, and its highly regarded programs have been implemented in schools and other settings across the country. Eden is recognized nationally for providing education and training in autism.









The Eden Outreach Program is a key component to the organization's efforts to help as many individuals with autism and their families as possible. Eden's experienced staff, resources, and services are made available to those who are not served at an on-site Eden program through a number of channels. Eden provides evaluation and consultative services and offers continuing education opportunities and other essential services as a way to support and train educators and families.

The Eden Assessment and Curriculum draws upon 38 years of clinical experience, and provides step-by-step instructions on how to effectively teach students with autism. Developed by Eden's team of highly qualified and experienced professionals, this comprehensive series of teaching programs is offered to school districts, and other professionals working with children and adults with autism and their families. The curriculum is available in both hard copy and online through ELMS (Eden's Learning Management System).

Eden School in Princeton, New Jersey is a twelve-month program available to children and adolescents aged three to 21. Teaching techniques are based in Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), and each student's curriculum is tailored to his or her specific needs and abilities and established on individual, annual assessments.

Eden's Adult Services provides essential support to families at the critical moment when individuals with autism reach adulthood and are no longer entitled to receive educational services. Employment training and placement, as well as residential programs, are core to Eden's mission to provide lifespan services and to empower individuals with autism to live meaningful, productive lives.

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Eden Outreach Program

Eden's Outreach Division provides a range of services designed to assist individuals with autism beyond Eden's doors. Services include early intervention, diagnostic, evaluation, consultation, supplemental behavior therapy, and family and professional training.

Diagnostic and Evaluative Services

Comprehensive diagnostic and evaluative services are provided in order to accurately identify and evaluate children and adults with Autism Spectrum Disorders as well as to provide appropriate recommendations. Outreach staff are also available to provide guidance to families in obtaining appropriate services once a diagnosis has been made.

Consultative Services

With the goal of providing guidance on "best practices" for autism services delivery, Eden Outreach serves in a consulting capacity to public and private schools, state and private agencies, and individual families. Consultations have been provided nationally and internationally.

Training Workshops

Training is offered for professionals, paraprofessionals, and parents interested in learning about autism and Applied Behavior Analysis. Workshops are led by highly-qualified Eden faculty who have significant experience with the material presented. Both in-person and online training is available.

Therapy Services (Wawa House)

Named in recognition for major funding support by the convenience store chain Wawa, Inc., this program provides early intervention services to children three years of age and under, and supplemental therapies to children over three who need additional help with speech and language therapy and behavior therapy. In-home parent training is also available.

Eden Assessment and Curriculum

The Eden Autism Assessment provides educators and therapists with a tool that allows for the accurate assessment of a student's current abilities and skill levels. This assessment identifies a student's strengths and weaknesses, assists with goal selection, tracks progress, and makes it easy to translate the assessment into concrete IEP goals.

Eden School (Institute)

Eden Institute is the educational division of Eden Autism Services serving children and adolescents 3-2I years of age. Teaching techniques are based in the principles of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), and each student's curriculum is tailored to his or her specific needs and abilities. Students are placed in and progress through Eden Institute programs according to age and skill level. At the start of each school year, each student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) is reviewed and revised in cooperation with parents and school district child study teams. The student/teacher ratio ranges from I:I to 3:I. Eden Institute provides classroom programming, supplemental programming, family services, and extended school year programming.

Classroom Programming

Early Childhood

Early Childhood focuses on developing communication skills, as well as learning readiness, self-care, and preacademics. Students receive the necessary foundation for learning.

Middle Childhood

Middle Childhood is essentially an extension of Early Childhood. Students continue to build the learning foundations, with an additional focus on pre-academics, language development, and independent living skills.

Transition

Transition is set-up similar to a small self-contained classroom. The students participate in small group instruction in academic, language, and pre-vocational skills, as well as, social interaction. These skills are also supplemented by individual instruction for each student.

High School I, 2 and 3

High School I, 2 and 3 classrooms provide learning experiences that range from basic communication, daily living, and work preparation skills paired with functional academics, clerical skills, and community-based work/study programs.

Supplemental Programming

Speech, Language and Communication

This program helps students develop individualized, pragmatic communication skills.

Adaptive Physical Education

This program enhances motor skills in individualized small group instruction from balance and fine motor to adapted sports skills.

After School Program and Summer Program

This program extends the day curriculum by providing constructive educational and recreational activities for Eden students.

Family Services

Parent and Family Support Program

Designed to educate and assist families through parent training, home visits, and support groups.

Respite Program

Trained Eden therapists are sent to the home for a specified number of hours each month with the purpose of giving families a "break" for a few hours.

Emergency Family Support Program

Provides short-term immediate care for an Eden student when his or her parents face a family emergency.

Eden Adult Services

Adult Residential Services

Eden operates a continuum of residential support options for adults with autism. Incorporated in 1979, Eden offers 24-hour residential support and training to meet the needs of each resident.

Eden group homes generally serve five to seven adults and employ a staff who stay in the home while on shift. The highly trained staff transcribe the Eden philosophy of community integration into a vibrant curriculum and experiential training opportunities on a daily basis. Parent, guardians, and siblings are encouraged to remain actively involved in an effort to support the concept of self-direction and to enhance the learning environment.

An additional component of the program is a commitment to giving back to the local community in which each residence is located. Staff and residents participate in area charity events including "adopting" their local firefighters, providing companionship to nursing home residents, and collecting items to ship to soldiers overseas.

Adult Employment Services

Since 1983, Eden has provided employment services for adults with autism. To that end, a range of opportunities is offered, from secure, center-based work, to supported employment, to competitive jobs. Eden's programming also takes into account participants' life goals, working on communication and language skills, encouraging social and emotional development and addressing activities of daily living.

Participant/Staff ratios range from 2:I to 4:I, depending upon the type of employment or skill development activity and participants' needs and abilities. Participants

are employed at over 30 different paid community job placements. A number of community employers also contract with Eden participants to do mailing, packaging, and assembly work. In addition, volunteer work is done at numerous locations including a local thrift store and a fair trade retail shop.

Eden Adult Employment Program is CARF (Commission on Accreditation and Rehabilitation Facilities) accredited. It is an assurance that the organization meets rigorous guidelines for service and quality and conforms to nationally and internationally recognized service standards.





Eden Autism Services Foundation

The Eden Autism Services Foundation serves as the advancement and fundraising division of Eden. Its purpose is to raise operating, capital, and endowment funds for Eden's programs. The Foundation raises money through the annual fund, capital campaigns, corporate and foundation giving, fundraising events, and the William J. Noonan Legacy Society.

Annual Fund

The annual fund is supported by parents, community members, family, and friends who care about Eden and its participants. Annual fund dollars go directly to support the organization's operating budget and help to close the gap between state funding and operating expenses.

Major Gifts and Capital Campaigns

Major gifts are vital to developing new initiatives and ensuring both the quality and sustainability of Eden's programs. Periodically, Eden engages in a capital campaign to address significant needs related to facilities, programs, and endowment. *Nurturing Today, Embracing Tomorrow* is Eden's most recent effort to build a new school in Princeton and endow critically important adult services.

Corporate and Foundation Giving

Grants in support of programs, sponsorship of special events, and employee matching gifts are important ways in which Eden receives financial support from the business and charitable foundation community.

Special Events

The Foundation hosts several fundraising events which are valuable to raising Eden's visibility and generating significant revenue.

William J. Noonan Legacy Society

The William J. Noonan Legacy Society honors individuals who have made arrangements to support Eden through their will or other estate planning vehicles.



President and CEO

Dr. Tom McCool, M.Ed, Ed.D

Dr. McCool was appointed President/CEO of Eden Autism Services in 2005.

From 1985 through 2005, Dr. McCool served in a number of capacities at Devereux, a national non-profit organization which provides services for persons with emotional, developmental and educational disabilities. From 1985 to 1996 he served as Executive Director of Devereux California, and from 1996 to 2005 he served as Devereux's National Vice President of Development and Government Relations. While in California, Dr. McCool was a gubernatorial appointee to the California Interagency Coordinating Council and served on the MIND Institute Advisory Board at UC Davis.

Dr. McCool is a Founding Commissioner of the National Commission on Accreditation of Special Education Services (NCASES), and founding member and current Vice Chairman of the National Association of Residential Providers of Adults with Autism (NARPA). In January 2012, he was elected President of the National Association of Private Schools for Exceptional Children (NAPSEC). He was also elected Vice Chairman of the Philadelphia Irish Business Chamber Network (IABCN). Dr. McCool is a long standing member of the Autism Society.

In 2010, Dr. McCool was named Innovator of the Year by the Princeton Regional Chamber of Commerce, and in 2012 the New Jersey Firefighters' Mutual Benevolent Association presented him with their prestigious Humanitarian Award.

Dr. McCool has presented at numerous professional conferences including the National Association of Private Schools for Exceptional Children, and Autism Society's National and International Conferences on Autism.

Dr. McCool received a Doctor of Education Degree in Educational Leadership from Fairleigh Dickinson University's Institute for Leadership Studies in Hackensack, New Jersey, and a Masters of Education Degree from West Chester State University, West Chester, Pennsylvania.

Chief Operating Officer Carol Markowitz, M.A., M.Ed

Carol Markowitz, M.A., M.Ed. is the Chief Operating Officer at Eden Autism Services in Princeton, NJ. Ms. Markowitz received a Bachelors degree in psychology from Douglass College, a Masters degree in Special Education from Rutgers University and a second Masters degree in Education Administration from The University of Phoenix. She holds New Jersey Certifications as a Teacher of the Handicapped, Supervisor of Instruction and Principal.

Ms. Markowitz has been with Eden Autism Services since its inception in 1975, as a teacher, Program Supervisor, and Director of Education. More recently she has assumed the position of Chief Operating Officer. As COO, she is responsible for the day-to-day operation of Eden's programs as well as wide-ranging strategic planning and budgetary initiatives at the schools, the early intervention program, adult services program, and group homes. She conducts pre-service and inservice training at Eden for both faculty and parents. She has conducted teacher training and program consultation on a state and national level and has made a variety of presentations at universities and conferences.

Ms. Markowitz is currently a visiting lecturer at Princeton University in the psychology department. She helped establish the autism program for Brick Township schools, and has served on statewide steering committees for the New Jersey Department of Education to develop "Autism Program Quality Indicators" and to develop and monitor the state's Alternate Proficiency Assessment.

Melinda Gorny McAleer is the Chief Development Officer for Eden Autism Services, located in Princeton, NJ. In her role, Melinda oversees the organization's advancement initiatives and activities including fundraising and communications. Rachel has been an active member of both ASAH and NAPSEC since 2004. She has completed NCASES site team training and has participated in site reviews for other private schools. She is also a member of the NAPSEC conference committee and became an NCASES commissioner in 2009.
